FROM THE FIRE CHIEF MARK DUERR

Happy summer, everyone. It's early June, and South Placer Fire District has multiple wildland deployments. SPFD sent crews to Rancho Cordova to assist our neighbors with a rapidly moving brush fire, and we have a crew deployed in Calaveras County. These deployments are part of the California Master Mutual Aid Agreement. This agreement was developed to leverage California fire service resources to protect communities like ours that need more resources to fight large wildland fires. SPFD will send a fire engine to assist other agencies in exchange for reciprocation should we ever need help. It's a great example of cooperation and teamwork, with your community playing a crucial role in protecting all our California communities.

It's shaping into an active fire season, so please make your home and property fire-safe. Your proactive measures can make a significant difference in preventing and mitigating the impact of wildfires. This newsletter contains recommendations and tips to help you in this important work.

WILDFIRE PREPAREDNESS

It's time to prepare for wildfires. This is a partial checklist; see the box to the right for more information and resources.

Harden your home—Protecting your home from direct flame, radiant heat, and flying embers is critical. Things that improve your home's chance of survival include non-combustible roofing, dual-pane windows, advanced venting, fireresistant decking, and more.

Defensible Space This is crucial for wildfire safety. There are three zones (graphic below). Zone 0 (0-5 feet) is the key to wildfire defense. Zones 1 and 2 cover up to 100 feet around your home and focus on clean-up and fuel reduction. Evacuation Plan - What will you do in the event of a wildfire? Everyone is different, so make a plan and practice it. Remember the six P's of evacuation -

- People and Pets:
- Papers, phone numbers, important documents;
- Prescriptions, vitamins, & eyeglasses;
- Pictures and irreplaceable memorabilia;
- Personal computers, hard drives & disks; and
- Plastic (credit cards, ATM cards, cash).

DISTRICT MASTER PLAN



The Fire District Master Plan, conducted by AP Triton, aims to help the District stay ahead of community growth and associated risks, ensuring that it continues to provide effective services to the community while also serving as a valuable resource for policymaking and budgeting decisions. On June 12, 2024, the SPFD Board adopted the Master Plan, the foundational planning document for the next 20 years. DISTRICT ISO RATING

The Insurance Services Office evaluates fire service through the Fire Suppression Rating how the FSRS works here, but in brief, a better rating (1-10, with 1 being the best) may are every 5-10 years; The District's last rating (2018) was 3/3y. In September, a new rating will become effective, which is an improvement to 2/2y.

DISTRICT UPDATES

New Staff - On June 10th, the District began an academy of six new hires, five Firefighter paramedics, and one apprentice. They are performing well and plan to serve the community by July 12th.
